Since the recent rulemaking on the minimum retroreflective of traffic signs we have received aquiries concluding the eligibility of Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIL) funds for sign replacement

While a variety of safety improvements, including signing, are eligible activities, section 14% of title 23 U.S.C. outlines specific requirements for identifying and priorithing projects. Data are living is the foundation of the HSTP and should be the determining factor when making funding decisions and allocating resources. Safety funds are to be used on the most of Colive treatments at the locations with the greatest needs.

In order for a sign replacement project to be 'unded with HSIP funds there must be a demonstrated need and a sucty benefit that is supported by data. In addition, safety projects funded with HSIP funds must be consistent with the State's Strategic Alighway Safety Plan (SFIP).

Lection 148(d)(2) of title 23 U.S.C. makes close that other Forest-aid funds are eligible to support and everage the entity program. In provements to safety feature, including traffic signs, that are routinely provided as part of a broader Forest-aid project, should be funded from the same source as the broader project. We en thursage the use prother Federal aid funds for system where replacement projects.

If your State plans to use finds available up the HSIP (2. U.S.C. 148) for traffic sign replacement, it is important that these funds be spent in the with the purpose of the program: "to achieve a significant reduction in traffic fatalities and serious injuries on public roads."
